As we approach the beginning of the examination season please can I ask all parents/carers to keep all of our Year 11 children in their thoughts and prayers.

In the Gospel yesterday we heard of Jesus as the good shepherd. But what does the image of Jesus the shepherd mean for us today? While sheep all look the same to us, a shepherd knows each of them individually. When a shepherd calls a sheep, the sheep recognises the shepherd's voice and respond. Just as the shepherd knows the sheep, the sheep know and trust the shepherd. Everyone who is entrusted with the care of others is a shepherd. Jesus offers us not only the fullness of life; he offers us the fullness of his life.
