It gives me great pleasure to write to you at the end of another very successful and productive term. The release of national school performance data from the Department for Education (DfE) has further confirmed the successes of our 2019 GCSE results. St James' students achieved excellent results that were significantly above national averages, resulting in a strong performance for a second successive year in terms of the Progress 8 accountability measure. They acknowledge strong performances across a wide range of subjects but special mentions for German, Drama, Food and Nutrition, Resistant Materials, Art, History and Mathematics. I am very proud of the education we provide for all our young people and the acknowledgement of this by the DfE is testament to the hard work of both staff and students in school.

I am especially pleased with how our year 7 students have settled into school life and are thriving. The number of parents choosing St James' as first choice has significantly increased for the first time in four years and initial projections from admissions suggests this number will grow again next year, a sign that St James' is once again the school of choice for our community.

A highlight of the term was the visit of Bishop Mark who came and formally opened our new chapel, part of the continuing exciting St James' re-brand. As previously communicated, the next step is to develop our new PE uniform; which will be available to purchase from the Easter holiday. The designs will be shared with all members of the school community in the New Year, with a view to the new uniform being phased in for all students over the period of a year. This will allow parents who have just purchased the "old" PE kit to make the transition over the period of 12 months.

As always, I am thankful for your support in continuing to help us by guiding your children to show respect for our school values of Family, Faith and Excellence. I would also be grateful if you would ensure that your children arrive to school on time, wear the correct uniform and school shoes, not trainers. We have been reiterating the importance of regular school attendance

and punctuality through assemblies, exploring the strong relationship between regular attendance and excellent results. We value your support reinforcing this message with your children in the New Year.

A final reminder that school will close for the Christmas break on Friday 20th December 2019 at 12:15pm and we will reopen to students on Tuesday 7th January 2019 at 8:30am.

As well as being a school holiday, it is also time to celebrate the birth of Our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ. I hope you have a wonderful Christmas, and that you take the opportunity to celebrate not just a 'festive season' but also remember the wonder of the Incarnation. It is one of the loveliest church services of the year.

ATTENDANCE NEWS

In order to celebrate attendance at St James' we provide regular initiatives where pupils can win prizes for their achievements and have their efforts rewarded.

Last half term, pupil's achieving 100% attendance were recognised by receiving a chocolate reward and a praise postcard through the post.

Following the October half term, we have presented trophies and a tub of chocolates to share, to the best attending form in each year group. This incentive will continue throughout the year, and will extend to a trophy being awarded to the form in each year group with the most improved attendance.

During assemblies, year groups enjoy the fortnightly attendance lottery we hold. This incentive is to reward short term attendance of 100% for a 2 week period. The winner is pulled from a draw and wins a £5 voucher.

The prizes for the end of this half term will be a chocolate Santa and a praise postcard for pupils who have achieved 100% for this half term. Pupils who have 100% attendance for the whole term will receive a selection box and a praise postcard.
