Senior Prefects

St James' Catholic High School has Senior Prefects every year. The most recent Senior Prefects appointments are Cameron (Cheadle Catholic Juniors) as Head Boy and Abby (Our Lady's) the Head Girl. The deputies are William (St Simon's) and Ellie (St Anthony's).

The Head Boy and Girl of the school are responsible for managing the whole of the Prefect Body, ensuring that all duties are carried out correctly and that the Prefects are the ultimate role models for all other pupils in the school. Duties of the Head Boy and Girl consist of representing the school as St James' ambassadors, making speeches at school events and being an integral part of the induction process for the new Year 7s in September.

The Senior Prefects are key to all major events that the school is involved in, such as organising Open Evenings and Parents Evenings, taking parents and pupils on tours of the school and generally welcoming visitors to St James'.

As ambassadors for the school, the Senior Prefects ensure that the views of all pupils are represented and listened to by coordinating student voice for a wide range of school issues such as teaching and learning and extracurricular activities.

"The relationships between teachers and students has encouraged me to take up the role of Head Boy" said Cameron.

"The school has taught me that the bare minimum is never acceptable. This was also true during the selection process for Senior Prefect" said William.

Transition

As students move from Primary to secondary school, we encourage ambitious goals. Everyone involved in the St James' family is responsible for creating a culture of high expectations and academic excellence. From the moment you choose our school, we work hard behind the scenes with your Primary School to get to know your child.

The success of your child at St James' depends very much on our partnership with you, the parents and carers. From this partnership we will develop high aspirations and resilience in your child, that will enable them to grow into well rounded, global Catholic citizens. St James' has strong traditional values of Family, Faith and Excellence, which support the very high expectations we have for our students. Our success is built upon a tradition of providing exceptional opportunities for children, empowering them and encouraging them to strive for excellence in all that they do.

Whether it be our extensive charity work, numerous educational visits or our partnerships with other local school and colleges, you can be assured that your child will receive a well-rounded Catholic education, that extends far beyond the classroom.

Curriculum

We aim for excellence throughout our curriculum, in order to shape well rounded, global Catholic citizens who achieve their full potential. We support, guide and inspire our students and their families through the different transition points between Key Stage 2 to 3, Key Stage 3 to 4 and Key Stage 4 to 5. We endeavour to ensure our students are happy, engaged and make continuous progress.

As part of our St James' mission we place great emphasis on Key Stage 3 i.e. Years 7-9. Our Key Stage 3 curriculum spans three years as we believe that students have the right to experience a wide range of different subjects across an extended period of time. We ensure that students receive a solid foundation across many subjects before specialising at Key Stage 4 in Year 10.

Our students at Key Stage 3 study a well-balanced curriculum including English, Mathematics, Science, Religious Education, Humanities; Geography and History, Creative Technology; including, Food Preparation and Nutrition, Resistant Materials, Textiles and Computing, as well as a Modern Foreign Language, Physical Education, Arts; Art, Music and Drama, and Personal, Social, Health and Citizenship Education (PSHCE).



Pastoral Care

Academic success is only one part of our curriculum. Woven throughout it is our outstanding pastoral support.

Students are carefully organised into form groups, taking on the advice and guidance of our Primary colleagues who know our students so well. In order to ensure stability, our students remain within these form groups for five years with the same Form Tutor and Head of Year. The Form Tutors and Heads of Year work to develop our students, through the academic and pastoral curricula, into well rounded, global Catholic citizens, who are proud to profess their faith.

Alumni

St James' has a proven track record of strong academic performance over many years. Most recently our Catholic community has achieved:

- Impressive positive progress 8 scores for the last four years
- In 2019, 84% of students achieved at least a grade 4 in English & Mathematics while 65% of students achieved a grade 5 in these subjects
- 64 grade 9s and 134 grade 8s in 2019 demonstrating exceptional attainment across a wide range of subjects
- Exceptional results in Mathematics, English, Open subjects and the Humanities placing us in the top 20% of similar schools nationally



Admission Arrangements

St James' Catholic High School was founded by the Catholic Church to provide education for children of Catholic families. Whenever there are more applications than places available, priority will always be given to Catholic children. in accordance with the oversubscription criteria listed below. The school is conducted by its Governing Board as part of the Catholic Church in accordance with its trust deed and articles of association and seeks at all times to be a witness to Our Lord Jesus Christ.

As a Catholic school, we aim to provide a Catholic education for all our pupils. At a Catholic school. Catholic doctrine and practice permeate every aspect of the school's activity. It is essential that the Catholic character of the school's education be fully supported by all families in the school. We therefore hope that all parents will give their full, unreserved and positive support for the aims and ethos of the school. This does not affect the right of an applicant who is not Catholic to apply for and be admitted to a place at the school in accordance with the admission arrangements.

The Governing Board is the admission authority and has responsibility for admissions to this school. The local authority undertakes the co-ordination of admission arrangements during the normal admission round 1. The Governing Board has set its admission number at 160 pupils to Year 7 in the school year which begins in September, 2020, Pupils with an Education. Health and Care Plan or a Statement of Special Educational Needs (see note 1). The admission of pupils with a statement of Special Educational Needs

or an Education. Health and Care Plan is dealt with by a completely separate procedure. Children with a Statement of Special Educational Needs or Education. Health and Care Plan that names the school must be admitted. Where this takes place before the allocation of places under these arrangements this will reduce the number of places available to other children

Oversubscription Criteria

At any time where there are more applications for places than the number of places available, places will be offered according to the following order of priority:

- 1. Catholic looked after and previously looked after children. (see notes 2&3)
- 2. Catholic children who live in an associated parish (or part Parish), (see notes 3&4)
- 3. Catholic children who attend an associated Catholic Primary School,
- 4. Other Catholic children. (see note 3)
- 5. Other looked after and previously looked after children. (see note 2)
- 6. Other Children who attend an associated Primary School 7. Any other children

Within each of the categories listed above. the following provision

(i) The attendance of a brother or sister at the school at the time of enrolment will increase the priority of an application (ii) Within each category so that the application will be placed at the top of the category in which the application is made after children in (1) above

Tie Break

Priority will be given to children living closest to the school determined by the shortest straight-line distance. For the purpose of allocating school places, distances will be measured consistently and will be measured as a straight line between the Local Land and Property Gazetteer (LLPG) address points for the respective home address and school. using the Easting and Northing for each address point. Measurements will be made using the local authority's school admissions data mapping software, which employs a Geographical Information System based on Ordnance Survey. In the event of distances being the same for

two or more children where this would determine the last place to be allocated. random allocation will be carried out and supervised by a person independent of the school. All the names will be entered into a hat and the required number of names will be drawn out.

The address from which distance will be measured will be the permanent residential address, at the time of application, of the parent with whom the child is normally resident. Where a child lives with parents with shared responsibility, each for part of a week, the home address is the address from which the child travels to school for the majority of school days per week. If the number of days is exactly equal the home address will be that of the parent who receives the Child Benefit.

Application Procedures and Timetable

To apply for a place at this school in the normal admission round, you must complete a Common Application Form available from the local authority in which you live. You will be advised of the outcome of your application on 1st March or the next working day, by the local authority on our behalf. If you are unsuccessful (unless your child gained a place at a school you ranked higher) you will be informed of the reasons, related to the oversubscription criteria listed above. and you have the right of appeal to an independent appeal panel.

All applications which are submitted on time will be considered at the same time and after the closing date for admissions, which is 31st October 2020.

Late Applications

Late applications will be considered after all those that were received by the deadline.

Admission of Children Outside their Normal Age Group

A request may be made for a child to be admitted outside their normal age group, for example if the child has experienced problems such as ill health.

Any such request should be made in writing to the Chair of the Admissions Committee at the school at the same time as the admission application is made. The Governing Board will make its decision about the request based on the circumstances of each case and in the best interests of the child. In addition to taking into account the views of the Headteacher, including the Headteacher's statutory responsibility for the internal organisation, management and control of the school, the Governing Board will take into account the views of the parents and of appropriate medical and education professionals, as appropriate.

Waiting Lists

In addition to their right of appeal. unsuccessful children will be automatically added to the waiting list. This waiting list will be maintained in order of the oversubscription criteria set out above and not in the order in which applications are received or added to the list. Waiting lists for admission will operate throughout the school year. The waiting list will be held



open until the last day of the summer term 2022. Inclusion in the school's waiting list does not mean that a place will eventually become available.

In-Year Applications

An application can be made for a place for a child at any time outside the admission round and the child will be admitted where there are available places. Applications are made directly to Stockport Local Authority, see www. stockport.gov.uk/schooladmissions or speak to a member of the school office for further details.

Where there are places available but more applications than places, the published oversubscription criteria, as set out above. will be applied.

If there are no places available, the child will be added to the waiting list (see above). You will be advised of the outcome of your application in writing. you have the right of appeal to an independent appeal panel.
