Value points for Family, Faith and Excellence have been awarded to pupils by staff during lessons and the current top achievers for each form are as follows:



20 Year 11 pupils successfully submitted InvestIN applications to take part in a virtual careers session. InvestIN provides students aged 12-18 with the opportunity to work alongside top professionals in some of the world's most competitive and desirable careers - law, medicine, investment banking, engineering and many more. We were

ATTENDANCE

This term has brought with it challenges which we, as a school, have never had to face before. And this has been especially noticeable in terms of the attendance of our students.
