Faith and Family

At the start of this term each Year 7 Form enjoyed a retreat day at Savio House that focused on our theme of gifts and talents. The day was filled with activities which helped pupils to recognise their own unique gifts and talents as well as celebrating the gifts of others.

The work done on the retreat days fed into the Year 7 Welcome Mass that took place at Our Lady's Church, Edgeley. Father Martin's homily inspired us all when he spoke of the importance of using our unique gifts and talents. It was a perfect way to welcome new pupils and their families into our community. Pupils have learnt the importance of respect, care and compassion for others this term. This kindness has been obvious in the impressive contributions to gift boxes for refugee families and in the many fund-raising activities being planned for Christian Aid. Each Form has nominated a team of Form representatives who are doing a fantastic job of coordinating the fund raising effort.

During Form time and PSHCE Year 7s have displayed great character and have been working together on icebreaker and team building activities as well as healthy living and safety online with a main focus on good mental health and resilience. Every opportunity to impress us and to let their talents shine has been taken. A large number of Year 7 contributed to European Languages Bake Off competition with Maoist Rafaela B, Isabel B, Joseph D, Grzegorz M & Issy B being recognised as Star Bakers.

Year 7 were also well represented in the National Poetry Day competition. We were very proud of all the entrants, but a special mention must go to the overall winner Miriam A and KS3 winner Joe L.

Eco Club and Equality Club both see many Year 7 pupils contributing to the weekly meetings and all of this reflects the genuine enthusiasm that our Year 7s have towards school life, key global issues of sustainability, stewardship and British Values.

Excellence

The huge number of value points received by Year 7 has been celebrated each week in assembly when many pupils have been rewarded with the popular fast-track or free lunch passes. In the termly data, Year 7s have shown an incredible attitude to learning, completing work to the best of their ability and immersing themselves in new and exciting subjects. 132 Year 7 pupils received grade 1 or 2 for their positive attitude to learning in all subjects, earning a place in the 1,2 Club. Sporting excellence has also been evident this term with Year 7 footballers winning an invitational tournament at Manchester United where they played 9 games, won 8 and drew 1, whilst conceding 0 goals throughout the competition.

We celebrate excellent performance from both girls and boys in the cross country. Well done to Eva, Finlay, Harrison & Conor in qualifying to represent Stockport in the Greater Manchester cross country.

The Year 7 girls netball team shone when they played against Kingsway winning 12-1.


What 7S have to say about the best bits of this term...

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YEAR 8



I have been incredibly impressed with Year 8 this term, especially in seeing them replicate the good habits and attitudes that held them in such good stead last year. Family

This year, students are invited to a careers talk specifically tailored to their interests. These career breakfasts are a great way for students to hear first hand experience of certain jobs and can hopefully inspire pupils to consider what they would like to do once they have left school.

Attendance at clubs has been brilliant with many Year 8s enjoying activities such as History film club, Eco club, STEM club and the Equality group where they presented information about other faiths and have looked at diversity. It has been great, therefore, to see lots of teachers praise students for their excellent work. I especially enjoyed Max's description of New York city in his English assessment:

"As I got out of the yellow cab, the first thing that hit me was the blinding lights. It felt like I had been reborn. The neon signs were everywhere, lighting up the roads with their vibrant colours. They made the city feel alive at night."

Since starting here at St James', the students have shown excellence in all manners of ways. I have been delighted to be able to reward them with queue jump passes and free lunches and am so proud of their efforts. They show the good humour, politeness and diligence I expect from St James' students and I am sure that they will continue this in the new year. Our





attendance of 94% is good but I am hoping it will be even better in 2022. Attendance is so crucial to students' understanding of topics and to their enjoyment of the social aspect of school. Family



Excellence



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YEAR 11

All 3 colleges have a lot in common in the sense that they all promoted their strong extra-curricular activities, mainly musical productions, sport teams, the Model UN etc. Since all 3 colleges are Catholic, there is a strong emphasis on learning about different faiths every week in Form sessions. ATTENDANCE

Despite continuing challenges due to the Covid pandemic, our pupils' resilience is shown by our good school attendance. This is consistently around 3% higher than the national average; an achievement we can all be proud of. During the winter months attendance is usually lower due to seasonal colds and viruses. It is important that your child attends school as much as possible so that their gap in knowledge is impacted as little as possible.

We continue to acknowledge good short-term attendance by holding a fortnightly attendance lottery for each Year Group. This incentive is to reward attendance of 100% for a 2 week period. The lucky winner is pulled from a draw and wins a £5 Amazon voucher. By way of recognising and treating our pupils who have attained 100% attendance since the start of the academic year, Christmas selection boxes will be handed out in the last few days of term. We will also be awarding the Form with the best attendance in each Year Group with a tub of Celebration sweets to share in Form time.
