Firstly, I hope that the bank holiday afforded you the opportunity to pause, reflect and give thanks for the life of Queen Elizabeth II. I felt this weekend was an opportunity to give thanks for a life of service and dedication.

We have our Open Evening taking place on 22nd September, Thursday this week, and school will close at 1.15pm for our children. The school buses have been arranged to arrive at this earlier time.
