Faith and Family

At the start of this term each Year 7 Form enjoyed a retreat day at Savio House that focused on our theme of Gifts and Talents. The day was filled with activities which helped the children to recognise their own unique gifts and talents as well as celebrating the gifts of others.

The work done on the retreat days fed into the Year 7 Welcome Mass that took place at Our Lady's Church, Edgeley. Father Martin's homily inspired us all when he spoke of the importance of using our unique gifts and talents. Year 7 have learnt the importance of respect, care and compassion for others this term. Their kindness has been obvious in the generous contributions to the Christmas foodbank collections and fund-raising activities that have been planned for Mary's Meals. Each Form has nominated a team of Form Representatives who are doing a fantastic job of coordinating the fundraising efforts.



During Form time and PSHCE Year 7s have displayed great character and have been working together on icebreaker and team building activities as well as focusing on healthy living, enterprise skills and diversity and prejudice.

Every opportunity to impress us and to let their talents shine have been taken this term. A large number of Year 7 contributed to European Languages Day and Bake Off competition with Lucy 7J winning most creative bake and Rory 7A winning most original bake whilst Harry 7E and Olivia 7E won the MFL quiz.



Chromebook Club, Lingua Franca club, Social Club, Dungeons and Dragons and Equality Club all see many Year 7 children contributing. This reflects the genuine enthusiasm that Year 7 children have towards school life, key global issues of sustainability, stewardship, and British Values.

September 2022 saw the launch of the St James' Literary Canon. All children in Year 7 were provided with an age appropriate, suitably challenging fiction text on the theme of 'Troubled Times and Troubled Lives'. Reading for pleasure is a key focus across the school and this has been a great opportunity for the children to access high quality literature and develop their own reading skills. After Christmas we will be swapping their books, so they have a new, exciting book on the termly theme of 'Strange Worlds and Unique Characters'.

The Year 7s have also been lucky enough to be part of the Book Buzz scheme, which is an initiative led by the Book Trust. Children were able to select a book from a choice of 17 different titles, which they have now received, and it is theirs to keep. It was amazing to see the excitement amongst the children when they received their books.

Excellence

The huge number of Value points received by Year 7 has been celebrated each week in assembly when many children have been rewarded with the popular free lunch passes. The pizza reward cinema afternoon was a lovely celebration for the children gaining the most Value points in a half term.



In the termly data Year 7 have shown an incredible attitude to learning, with an overwhelming majority of children completing work to the best of their ability and immersing themselves into new and exciting subjects.

87% of Year 7 children received grade 1 or 2 for their positive attitude to learning in all subjects, earning a place in the 1,2 Club. A special mention, however, must go to Tianna and Hermionie for receiving all ATL 1s in their classwork. This is an amazing achievement.

16 very impressive election statements were submitted by Year 7 children for a place on School Council, reflecting the enthusiasm and interest displayed by this Year group in school life. We are very proud of all who ran for election and look forward to working with the worthy winners; Harry K, Seth C, Luke M, Tianna C, Lucy H and Zara R.

I have been incredibly impressed with Year 8 this term, behaviour is superb for the vast majority of our Year group with 52% receiving zero behaviour points and almost 80% receiving less than 2 behaviour points. Their approach to lessons is, on the whole, mature and sensible, and they are extremely talented in all aspects outside of the classroom with incredible achievement in football, netball and athletics and massive participation and talent in the school drama production. In doing so, it has been really evident that Year 8 has been following our school Values of Family, Faith and Excellence.

Family

In Year 8, children are invited to a careers talk specifically tailored to their interests. So far there have been careers talks from the Hilton Hotel, Manchester Airport and another about careers in law. These career breakfasts are a great way for children to hear first hand experience of certain jobs and can hopefully inspire children to consider what they would like to do once they leave. They will continue throughout the year.

Attendance at clubs has been brilliant with many Year 8s enjoying activities such as STEM club, Youth SVP and the Equality Club where they presented information about other faiths and cultures. We have the largest Year group participation in the Youth SVP who recently wrote Christmas cards for prisoners. We have also had guest speakers coming in to inform us about a range of issues including knife crime. Two of our Year group, Javier and Ashton played the "Last Post" in the school corridors for Remembrance, whilst others took part in a service and laid a wreath.

Some of our Year 8 cohort have been benefiting from some reading and literacy interventions from Year 11 Prefects. We also had 18 children taking part in the drama production Matilda which was a massive hit on the 13th and 14th December.

We have had 30 girls and 33 boys represent school in various sports so far this year. The girls have reached the second round in a national competition in netball, the boys have reached the quarter finals of the Catholic Cup and Stockport League in football and have reached the KS3 badminton finals.

We have regular attendees at Mass from Year 8 when it is held on Wednesday lunchtime in the Chapel, I am sure those children find the serene experience of Mass a contrast to the hustle and bustle of a normal lunchtime. I hope they can find their peaceful place in school and I am sure this passes onto their peers and lessons afterwards. We are the highest attending Year group at mass and the SVP group, there is strong spirituality running through our cohort, they are the future leaders of our churches, schools and faith.

On 14th and 15th February, Year 8 will be attending a retreat at Ladybridge Connect, Cheadle Hulme. These days will provide an opportunity for children to bond, learn more about their faith and consider the sacrifices and changes we all make during Lent. There will be a letter with more information about this in the new year. The Year group have been brilliant at bringing in food and toiletries for the Foodbanks showing the warmth and kindness that they have for others. We have already completed 3 Charity events for Mary's Meals, 8A ran a basketball competition on the 12th December, 8M ran a Christmas tombola on the 9th December and 8A ran a Basketball challenge on the 19th December.

Excellence

In the recent termly data, a fantastic 75% of Year 8 children made it into the 1.2 club for Attitude to Learning. Nine of those children received a 1 in every single subject; a terrific achievement. Those children were:

Possessing an excellent Attitude to Learning is so important because it enables a greater understanding of the content of lessons and allows children to reach their potential. It has been great, therefore, to see lots of teachers praise children for their excellent work.

Since starting here at St James', the children have shown excellence in all manners of ways. I have been delighted to be able to reward them with 66 free lunches so far this year and am so proud of their efforts. They show the good humour, politeness and diligence I expect from St James' children and I am sure that they will continue this in the new year. Our attendance of 94.9% is good but I am hoping it will be even better in 2022. Attendance is so crucial to a children's understanding of topics and to their enjoyment of the social aspect of school. If any children are worried about catching up on work missed or any other obstacles that may impede their enjoyment of school, I am always available for a conversation as is Mrs McCarthy in Emmaus. Homework club is available every day after school in OR1.

Thank you for all your support in ensuring that our children reach these high demands. Year 9 have enjoyed a successful winter term with plenty going on inside and outside of the classroom. It has been fantastic to see that the enthusiasm for extra-curricular activities that the children had in Year 7 has not waned two years later; so many children attend a variety of clubs. Year 9 children are integral members of STEM Club, Equalities Club, Computer Club and the School Council. Many of our children are talented

musicians, some spend their free time in the music room whilst others have showcased their abilities in the Matilda musical. The children continue to partake in sporting activities and I've loved hearing about the successes of the basketball team who have reached the Stockport finals. Children have been generous in their donations and involvement in charity events, such as in 9C's brilliant tombola that raised £100.

The termly data is great proof of Year 9's fantastic attitude to learning. The majority of children, 64%, scored an ATL1 and 2 for both classwork and homework in all lessons. This reflects the hard work that they put into their work. A further 59 children only had a 3 for one subject; showing that if they focused more in that one lesson, the amount consistently reaching outstanding and good Attitudes to Learning would be even more impressive. Ten children achieved the remarkable feat of scoring an ATL1 for all of their lessons. They were:

Faith

Our Year 11 Faith Prefects had a wonderful opportunity to participate in the UK Pilgrimage of the Relics of St Bernadette in Chester back in September. It was a thoroughly enjoyable and uplifting experience for the children. Back in October, the children took part in an in-school retreat run by Miss Hazelwood, the theme being Lourdes and Our Lady. The children reflected on 3 important key features of Lourdes, - the stone, the candle and the holy water and considered how these could be brought into their own lives. They wrote private prayers and made prayer beads that represented the rosary. It was a lovely prayerful reflection and I know the children got a lot from it.

Excellence

The children have listened to a number of college presentations during assembly time, so that they are fully informed about their post 16 choices. We have had speakers from Aquinas, Loreto, Xaverian, Cheadle, and Manchester College and in addition to that we had a very well-attended Careers Convention, where we had representation from a variety of colleges and businesses who offer post 16 opportunities. A huge thank you to Mrs Rarity and Miss Ashworth for organising that opportunity for the children. The children are currently making big choices about their futures and filling in application forms, and I am once again, very proud of the way that they are getting themselves organised, visiting open days and attending taster days.

As I write this, the children are sitting their first mock exam and they have a busy couple of weeks ahead of them, however I know that the hard work that they have put in so far will pay off and the results will demonstrate this.

I would also like to give a special mention to our Head Boy Qiyi who recently spoke at a Catholic Conference at St Bede's College about the transmission of the Catholic Faith in our Catholic schools. We are incredibly proud of him.

Our Deputy Head Boy Rodrigo attended the House of Commons and spoke about climate change, a subject that is very close to his heart. The full video is on our school Twitter feed and is well worth a watch. We are all so proud of the work Rodrigo does in his role as Member of Youth Parliament.

ATTENDANCE

Our whole school attendance remains above the national average, which is a great achievement.

Regular attendance at school is important as absenteeism will impact on your child's academic progress; children need to attend school regularly to benefit from their education.

A child who has only 90% attendance misses almost 4 weeks of school every year. That's over 100 hours of learning lost. If young people do not attend school regularly, they will experience difficulty in keeping up with their studies. They also miss out on the many activities and opportunities that we offer at St James' Catholic High School that support the curriculum and nurture their growth into young adults. Children who do not attend school regularly are at a greater risk of becoming involved in crime or becoming a victim of abuse.

Here at St James' Catholic High School we believe that regular school attendance is the key to enabling children to maximise the educational opportunities available to them and become emotionally resilient, confident and competent adults who are able to realise their full potential and make a positive contribution to their community.

Children and parents often don't realise the impact of having time off school;

As a way of celebrating our children who have attained 100% attendance since the start of the academic year, we will be rewarding these children with a selection box this Christmas. Our fortnightly attendance initiative of a £5 voucher continues to be a popular incentive.
