We are delighted with the way Year 7 has settled into life at St James'. Year 7s are already reflecting our school values of Family, Faith and Excellence in all that they do. It has been a pleasure seeing them integrate into school life so successfully.

Faith and Family

At the start of this term each Year 7 Form enjoyed a retreat day at Savio House that focused on our theme of Gifts and Talents. The day was filled with activities which helped children to recognise their own unique gifts and talents as well as celebrating the gifts of others.

The work done on the retreat days fed into the Year 7 Welcome Mass that took place at Our Lady's Church, Edgeley. Father Martin's homily inspired us all when he spoke of the importance of using our unique gifts and talents. It was a perfect way to welcome the new children and their families into our community.

The children have learnt the importance of respect, care and compassion for others this term. Their kindness has been obvious in the generous contributions to the Christmas foodbank collections and fund-raising activities that have been planned for CAFOD. Each Form has nominated a team of Form Representatives who are doing a fantastic job of coordinating the fund-raising efforts.

During Form time and PSHCE, Year 7s have displayed great character and have been working together on icebreaker and team building activities as well as focusing on healthy living, enterprise skills and diversity and prejudice.

Every opportunity to impress us and to let their talents shine has been taken this term. A large number of Year 7 contributed to the European Day of Languages Bake Off competition. The £150 raised from the sale of cakes went to Macmillan as part of the Macmillan coffee morning week.

We were overwhelmed by the number of children who put themselves forward for a place on the School Council. An anonymous vote took place within Year 7 and the children with the most votes will represent us on the School Council this year. This is a massive responsibility and commitment which we know our Representatives will rise to.

Chromebook Club, Eco Club and Dungeons and Dragons all see many Year 7 children contributing to the weekly meetings. This reflects the genuine enthusiasm that Year 7 children have towards school life, key global issues of sustainability, stewardship, and British Values.

Excellence

The huge number of value points received by Year 7 has been celebrated each week in assembly when many children have been rewarded with the popular free lunch passes. The pizza reward cinema afternoon was a lovely celebration for the children gaining the most value points in a half term and the best ATL data from the Termly Data Report.

In the termly data, Year 7 have shown an incredible attitude to learning, with children completing work to the best of their ability and immersing themselves into new and exciting subjects. An impressive number of Year 7 children received grade 1 or 2 for their positive attitude to learning in all subjects for both homework and classwork. We were delighted that the termly data reports reflect the way Year 7 has settled in.

Sporting excellence has also been evident this term with Year 7 boys and girls representing the school at football, netball, basketball and cross country. Since joining us in September, our Year 7 children have demonstrated our value of Excellence in their sporting achievements. The Y7 football team has made strong progress in the Stockport League competition winning all 3 league games so far. They also won the Manchester United invitational tournament competing against other schools from in and around the Greater Manchester borough. During the Stockport Cross Country, we had a number of Y7 children compete and represent St James' in an extremely competitive event. Sam of 7J superbly finished in the top 10 securing his place in the Greater Manchester competition.

The Y7 girls have also made excellent sporting progress since joining us in September. We have had over 30 girls take part in netball, we came runners up in the Stockport Schools football Year 7 Tournament and they have won the Stockport Schools KS3 basketball tournament. 10 girls took part in the Greater Manchester Determination festival. Overall we have been so impressed with the amazing start.

Great music and drama skills have been in the spotlight with many Year 7 children joining the cast of Annie.

There is clearly a lot of talent within Year 7 and we are confident that the children will continue to show a passion for learning in 2023

I have been incredibly impressed with Year 8 this term, behaviour is superb for the vast majority of our Year group with 42% receiving zero behaviour points and almost 75% receiving less than 2 behaviour points. Their approach to lessons is on the whole mature and sensible, and they are extremely talented in all aspects outside of the classroom with incredible achievement in football, netball and athletics and massive participation and talent in the school drama production. In doing so, it has been really evident that Year 8 have been following our school values of Family, Faith and Excellence.

Family

This year, the children are invited to a careers breakfast, a talk specifically tailored to their interests. So far there have been careers talks from Stockport County about careers in sport, and coming up are talks about careers in law and media. These career breakfasts are a great way for children to hear first hand experience of certain jobs and can hopefully inspire children to consider what they would like to do once they have left school. They will continue throughout the year.

Attendance at clubs has been brilliant with many Year 8s enjoying activities such as STEM club and Chromebook club. Twelve of our Year group read at the Service of Remembrance that was streamed into classrooms.

We also have 20 children taking part in the drama production, Annie, which is due to take place on Tuesday 6th, Wednesday 7th and Thursday 8th February 2024.

We have had 30 girls and 33 boys represent school in various sports so far this year.

Faith

We have six regular attenders at Mass from Year 8 when it is held on Wednesday lunchtime in the Chapel, I am sure those children find the serene experience of Mass a contrast to the hustle and bustle of a normal lunchtime. I hope they can find their peaceful place in school and I am sure this passes onto their peers and lessons afterwards. There is strong spirituality running through our cohort, they are the future leaders of our churches, schools and faith

The Year group have been brilliant at bringing in food and toiletries for the Chelwood foodbank showing the warmth and kindness that they have for others. We have already completed 3 charity events for CAFOD; 8A ran a basketball competition on the 12th December, 8M ran a Christmas tombola on the 9th December and 8E ran a Crossbar challenge on the 19th December.

Excellence

In the recent termly data, a fantastic 75% of Year 8 children made it into the 1,2 club for Attitude to Learning. Seven of those children received a 1 in every single subject; a terrific achievement. Those children were:

Possessing an excellent attitude to learning is so important because it enables a greater understanding of the content of lessons and allows children to reach their potential. It has been great, therefore, to see lots of teachers praise children for their excellent work.

Since starting the year, the children have shown excellence in all manners of ways. I have been delighted to be able to reward them with 66 free lunches so far this year and am so proud of their efforts. They show the good humour, politeness and diligence

I expect from St James' children and I am sure that they will continue this in the New Year. Our attendance of 95.6%, is the second highest in school and 3.4% above national average. I hope we can hit 97% attendance in 2024. Attendance is so crucial to a child's understanding of topics and to their enjoyment of the social aspect of school. If any children are worried about catching up on work missed or any other obstacles that may impede their enjoyment of school, I am always available for a conversation, as are the Pastoral Team in Emmaus. Homework club is available every day after school in ORI.

Thank you for all your support in ensuring that our children reach these high demands. I would like to express my thanks for the hard work and care shown by my Form Tutors- Mrs Williams, Miss Delohery, Miss Adams, Miss Jeffers, Mrs Edwards, and Mr Hill. Year 8 are so lucky to have such wonderful Tutors. I hope you and your family have a restful and peaceful Christmas.

Throughout the last few weeks, the children have been working hard to raise money for Cafod and also to provide food for the local foodbank.

Unsurprisingly, Year 10 have approached their GCSEs with enthusiasm and maturity. Already, so many children are displaying the traits and work ethic needed for success in Year 11. The recent termly data recognised this superb attitude to learning with 79% of the cohort receiving all 1s and 2s for Attitude to Learning; an increase of 15% from last term. Incredibly, 25 children received all 1s, a fantastic feat. It is important to keep this momentum going. It is not too early for children to have an appreciation of different revision strategies and we have been discussing what works for us during Form time. For example, if a child made one revision flashcard per subject per week, imagine how many they'd have at their disposal by their Year 11 mocks in a year's time.

Of course, there will be obstacles along the way to achieving success in Year 11, and it is perfectly natural for the children to have found the jump from Key Stage 3 to 4 a difficult one. Our retreat

with the Shrewsbury Diocese focused on the resilience needed to overcome the difficulties that can come alongside change. It was a really positive day that gave the children an opportunity to consider what they want to aspire towards.

Regarding aspiration, the children have been active in their pursuit of work experience in July. Thank you to everyone for supporting with this. I encourage the children to go into any career opportunity with an open mind; the worst case scenario is that a job is crossed off the list. For example, some children had a very interesting talk with a lawyer recently.

The Year 10s continue to excel with their extra-curricular activities. We have some real leaders who have enjoyed supporting primary school children in their sport, whilst many children are heavily involved in the production of Annie. This year will see some exciting

residentials, such as the ski trip and visits to Germany, Borneo, Iceland and London.

Finally, you may be aware that in order to become the Director of Humanities after Christmas, I have to step down as Head of Year. I will still be teaching many Year 10s Geography and History, and will obviously still be here to support the children in their remaining time here as any member of staff would. I will maintain a very soft spot for a remarkable group of children. It is incredibly rare to feel specific pride about such a large group of young adults, but they definitely are a source of great pride to me and I am very fond of them. It is easy to forget that they started St James' at the height of Covid, without an official goodbye from their Primary school and an official hello from us. There were no ice-breaking retreats and the majority of the first year was in the guise of online learning without the fun and socialising that a new school should

We continue to maintain our high expectations and standards from our children and those children falling below our expectations will be sanctioned.

Staff are keen to give the children the best opportunities to succeed. Revision classes take place after school for a number of subjects. Miss Li is also available to support with homework every evening until 4pm at school.

The first termly data was really positive. 66% of Year 11 achieved all 1s and 2s in their Attitude to Learning scores, of which 18% scored all 1s. This is a phenomenal achievement and testament to their hard work and dedication to their studies. Well done! Keep up the hard work. There is still lots to do before the GCSEs are upon us but it will all be worth it in August.

ATTENDANCE

With the end of term approaching, I would like to thank each child and their family for their commitment and support to attendance. Current statistics show we are currently achieving 95.3% attendance. We proudly sit 4% above the national average.

As a school, we recognise the correlation between attendance and high achievements in our grades. A high percentage of attendance and punctuality to lessons means children don't miss out on learning, gain key knowledge, and grow more confident in themselves, resulting in success. High attendance in lessons statistically lowers school-based anxiety in children.

St James' target for each child is to achieve a 96% attendance and we like to recognise high success through many different forms of rewards. Our rewards include a fortnightly attendance lottery drawer for each Year group where children can win passes such as, skip the queue at lunch, a free meal, or even a £5 Amazon voucher. Over Advent, those children with 100% attendance will each be rewarded with a Christmas treat.

Although we can celebrate successes, I want to remind you of the importance of telling the school why and when your child is absent. A child with no reason is given an unauthorised mark. Our main priority is the safeguarding of children, so please inform us daily.

Excellent attendance at St James' is taken very seriously; our children must strive to attain 100% attendance.
