CATHOLIC LIFE AND MISSION

The Catholic life of our school underpins everything we do and is Christ centred with our school purpose being "To educate and develop global Catholic citizens."

It was lovely to return to school after the summer holidays to see the faith garden flourishing. During CEW week, the children in Year 8 had weeded and tidied the faith garden and they planted flowers and vegetables. Over the summer it had been fenced, to protect the grass and Mrs Dooley had been faithfully watering the plants. The grass is now lush and the garden is available as a quiet outdoor space for prayer and contemplation.

Each of our new Year 7 forms were lucky enough to enjoy the retreat days run by Shrewsbury Diocesan Youth Team. The children enjoyed the games and activities and the opportunity for spiritual development around the theme of 'gifts and talents'. We were impressed by the maturity with which they approached the day and their behaviour was impeccable.

In September, the whole school came together in the sports hall to start the new academic year off in a spirit of prayer and reflection. Regular hymn practices were introduced in which children are taught the hymns for Mass where we will revisit well-known hymns and introduce new ones, to widen our repertoire.

Some of our children attended a Mass to celebrate the canonisation of St. Carlos Acutis along with our Chaplain. Fr. Martin presented St. James' school with a portrait of this new saint.

At the beginning of October, our school hosted the 'icon' picture that has travelled on pilgrimage around the diocese. Children from Cheadle Catholic school brought the icon to us and they shared their work and prayers. A small group of our children took the icon to Sacred Heart school in Baguley and led an assembly. They represented our school well and were greeted with enthusiasm by the children.

In October, we had a welcome Mass for year 7, hosted by Fr Samuel at St. Ann's Church in Cheadle. The Mass was extremely well attended. It was a joyous occasion in which the children led the prayers and sang like angels.

Year 8 children went to a diocesan event run by the Youth Team and met with young people from other schools at a school in Chester. The event is known as 'Mini Dash' as the diocesan headteachers meet together on the same day. Our children enjoyed interviewing Mr. Pontifex and asking him about his role as a headteacher of a Catholic school.

There have been voluntary Masses in the Chapel at lunchtime and these have been well attended by children from across the year groups. Some of our children have written the prayers of the faithful, served and read at the Mass.

In November it was Year 11's turn to go on a retreat for the day. They enjoyed the opportunity to step away from preparation for mocks and to reflect on their life journeys. They thought about moving on and contemplated which signs are worth following.

Children were invited to pray the rosary in the Chapel during the month of October. We answered Pope Leo's call to pray for peace. It was wonderful to see children regularly attending these sessions and praying for members of their families and peace in the world.

Key stage 3 children have had opportunities for prayer and reflection in the Chapel during RE lessons. They have been able to think about the friendship and joy between Mary and Elizabeth and to reflect on the relationships in their own lives. During Advent, they have been reflecting on a theme of prophecy and promises and have learned





about God's promises to us. It has been a privilege to share this time with our children who have participated in these sessions with such positivity and maturity.

A quiet but significant development has been the establishment of a St. Vincent de Paul group in school. Children of all ages are invited to join so that they can put their concern into action. Our members have expressed their concern for refugees and for the poor. We have discussed what we can do for the lonely members of our community and particularly for women in need. This term, we have been painting tealight holders to give as gifts and making Christmas cards. We have also discussed a 'hungry cupboard' for those who don't have enough to eat. This term, they have been supported by Colette Halkon, a link volunteer and by Sheilagh Lochery, a parishioner who is also an SVP member.

Finally, our 'Knit and Natter' group has been well attended and has given children an opportunity to learn new skills so that they can perhaps use it to benefit others.

It has been a busy term and we are looking forward to rounding it off with our parishioner's party on 12th December and our Advent Mass on 16th December.

Children at St James' have been praying for family and friends and members of our community throughout this term, especially in faith and family time. We ask for your prayers and continued support in the new year.

It is hard to believe that Year 7 have already completed their first term at St James'. We couldn't be happier with the fantastic way that they have settled in and despite a nervous start in September, children are adapting to their new routines and our high expectations. Year 7 are already reflecting our school values of Family, Faith and Excellence in all that they do. It has been a pleasure seeing them integrate into school life so successfully.

Faith and Family

At the start of this term each Year 7 Form enjoyed a retreat day at St Ann's that focussed on the theme of Gifts and Talents. The day was filled with activities run by the Youth Mission from the Shrewsbury Diocese and helped children to recognise their own unique aifts and talents as well as celebrating the gifts of their new peers. Form Tutors, Miss Ellison, Mr Baggaley and Ms Woods all had a fantastic few days getting to know the new Year Group. We saw the children start to bond as a school family and this has continued to grow throughout the term.

The work done on the retreat days fed into the Year 7 Welcome Mass that took place at St Ann's Church, Cheadle Hulme. Each form delivered part of the Mass, including serving on the altar. It was lovely to see children's' faith in action and was a perfect way to welcome new children and their families into our community.

Meeting so many new parents at Parent Tutor Evening to make the important home school connection was another important event this term and on 23rd April parents will have the opportunity to meet class teachers online for the academic Parents' Evening. Year 7 have developed their faith in two whole school Masses and many assemblies. A highlight of this term was when children in 7M and 7A (photo) delivered assemblies to the rest of the Year Group and when Neil and Ann from Good News visited us, presenting all children with their own Good News New Testament. A representative from Youth SVP also joined one of our assemblies to present the new members with their badges and prayer cards. This was a special occasion that was nice to celebrate as a whole Year Group.

This term we have focused on the importance of respect, care and compassion for others. Children's kindness has been evident in the generous contributions to the Bare Necessities collection as well as the Christmas foodbank collections. 7S collected the most items for Bare Necessities and enjoyed a Form breakfast to reward their generosity. Each Form has nominated a team of Form representatives who are doing a fantastic job of co-ordinating the fund-raising efforts and Form activities.

Every opportunity to impress us has been taken this term. Chromebook Club, Drama Club, Dungeons and Dragons, Choir and Creative Writing Club all see many Year 7 children attending. It was fantastic to see some children join the cast of Sister Act and for them to be supported by their peers in the audience. This reflects the genuine enthusiasm that Year 7 children have towards school

Many Year 7 also contributed to European Day of Languages Bake Off competition and received certificates and prizes in assembly for their amazing bakes. The £180 raised from the sale of cakes went to Macmillan as part of the Macmillan coffee morning week.

A number of children in each Form put themselves forward for a place on the School Council and have been meeting at lunchtimes to share requests and ideas to improve different aspects of the school. This role is a massive responsibility and commitment, and we are so proud to see Year 7 involved in the wider life of the school.

Excellence

The introduction of the Expected Excellence card was an opportunity for Yr7 to shine this term. Over 130 children were invited to the rewards breakfast for half term 1. These children received one or no signatures on their card showing all aspects of uniform and organisation had met our high standards.

Year 7 were complimented on the way they represented St James' in the Road Safety workshops organised by Stockport LEA. We hope the information received will be helpful in keeping children safe, especially when travelling to and from school.

The huge number of value points received by Year 7 has been celebrated each week in assembly when many children have been rewarded with the popular free lunch passes. Joyce C in 7A has received the most value points this term and over 75% of Year 7 have no behaviour points at all. This is really incredible and reflects a very special year group. The cinema rewards afternoon was a lovely celebration for the children gaining the most value points in the first half term and the highest Attitude to Learning data from the Termly Data Report.

The Year 7 termly data reflects the outstanding attitude to learning children have shown, with children completing work to the best of their ability and immersing themselves into new and exciting

An impressive 87% of children received grade 1 or 2 for their positive attitude to learning in all subjects, earning a place in the 1,2 Club. A special mention, however, must go to Florence B 7J, Lawrence G 7A,























Nancy H7S, Ignacy M7M, Theia M7S and Patrick S7M for receiving all ATL1s in their classwork. This is a truly amazing achievement. Sporting excellence has also been evident this term. Year 7 boys have made an excellent start. The football team have advanced to the 4th Round of the English School's competition, as have their 'B' team counterparts. Badminton has also been a big success, with lots of boys participating at both lunchtime and after school practices. 7X beat 7Y in the intra-school badminton match, with a similar fixture set up for rugby. A team of badminton players recently visited Cheadle Hulme School for a friendly fixture. After Christmas, it's onto table tennis and basketball, with the football and badminton fixtures continuing as well!

Year 7 girls have also had an action packed first term with teams represented in football, netball, hockey, dodgeball and athletics. The netball team has been incredibly popular with over 30 girls already playing for St James' in fixtures against Reddish, CHHS, CHS, Bramhall and Kingsway. Victories against Kingsway and Bramhall saw them move into a strong position in the Year 7 league. The girls football teams have taken part in the Stockport league, Stockport Cup, English schools cup and SIS cup as well as a Stockport County 6 a side tournament. A number of Year 7 children play hockey both for St James' and clubs outside of school. Alongside all of these sports and fixtures children have also attended badminton practice, dodgeball competitions and athletics held and Woodbank Park.

There is clearly a lot of talent within Year 7 and we are confident that children will continue to show a passion for learning in 2026. We would like to take this opportunity to thank the Form Tutors; Miss Nagdee, Mrs Ellis, Mrs Bennett, Mr Pedley, Mr Murphy, Mrs Booth and Mrs Floyd and Mr Greenlees for their care and support. The kindness and hard work of Form Tutors alongside Miss Ellison, the Year 7 Pastoral Manager, have hugely contributed to the positive way in which the Year 7 children have settled.

We hope that Year 7 have enjoyed their first term as much as we have, and we would like to thank them for showing such positivity and enthusiasm. We are incredibly proud of this new addition to the St James' family.

We welcomed the Youth Offending team into school this past half term to talk to the year group about cyber crime. They talked about staying safe on line and highlighted current issues, such as sexting, encouraging ghost mode, being transparent with parents/carers about who they are speaking to and they gave examples of people who had been unsafe online and the subsequent consequences. I hope that the children took a lot from it. It was certainly very useful and informative.

On 28th November we were lucky to have our local MP Tom Morrison come into school to talk to some of our children. Discussions took place predominantly about knife crime, the police and public transport issues. Tara M from 9C said: "I really enjoyed the meeting on Friday. Year 10 began their Key Stage 4 courses in September, and with this has come a noticeable increase in maturity and commitment. They have settled well into the challenges and rigour of GCSE study. Behaviour has been excellent, with 44% of children receiving no behaviour points, 55% receiving one or fewer, and 75% receiving fewer than three—a superb achievement.

Outside the classroom, Year 10 continue to impress with strong performances in football, rugby, netball and athletics, as well as outstanding participation in the school production. It is clear that they are living out our school values of Family, Faith and Excellence.

Family

Attendance at clubs has been excellent, with many Year 10 children enjoying activities such as Dungeons & Dragons Club, the SVP group and lunchtime Mass.

So far this year, 28 girls and 34 boys have represented the school in sport. The KS4 boys' badminton team, which includes four Year 10s, won their qualifying round and will compete in the Stockport finals in December. Many Year 10 boys have also taken up rugby outside school; it was a pleasure to watch eight of them play in a recent club fixture, and we hope to arrange school matches soon.

Year 10 made a huge contribution to the school production of Sister Act, with four children taking lead roles and many more supporting behind the scenes. Their performances were outstanding.

We are incredibly proud of Ellie S, who last year was named Stockport Young Carer of the Year and this year has been awarded the British Citizen Youth Award, presented at the Houses of Parliament. She is a wonderful example of the exceptional young people at St James'.

Faith

Ten Year 10 children regularly attend lunchtime Mass, taking time for quiet reflection away from the busyness of the school day. A strong sense of spirituality runs through the Year group, and they are developing into the future leaders of our churches and communities.

This week, 11 children were commissioned into the Saint Vincent de Paul Society. They have already attended several meetings and will soon begin supporting vulnerable members of our school and wider community. Their commitment and compassion are something to be very proud of.

The Year group also contributed generously to the Shoe Box Appeal for children in Ukraine. Their warmth, kindness and respect for others continue to shine through everything they do. Well done to all involved.

Excellence

In the recent termly data, an impressive 81% of Year 10 children achieved grades 1 or 2 in every subject for Attitude to Learning, up from 67% at the same point last year. Even more remarkable, 31 children achieved a grade 1 in every subject, compared with just 6 last year—a truly outstanding achievement. These children were

Possessing an excellent attitude to learning is key, as it allows children to fully understand lessons and reach their potential. It has been wonderful to see so many children praised by teachers for their dedication and effort.

Since the start of the year, Year 10 have demonstrated excellence in many ways. I was delighted to reward 90 children with a special breakfast for consistently following our excellence expectations—a truly memorable event.

The Year group continue to show good humour, politeness, and the diligence we expect from St James' children. Attendance is currently 93.4%, the third highest in the school and 2% above the national average. We hope to reach 97% in 2025, as regular attendance is vital for both learning and social development. If any children are concerned about catching up on work or face other challenges, I and the Pastoral Team in Emmaus are always available to help.
