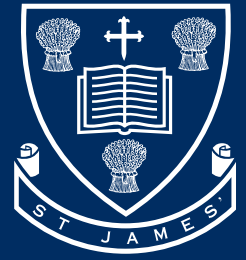


School Newsletter

July 2019



We are almost at the end of another highly successful year, in which St James' Catholic High School continues to achieve rates of progress significantly above the national average. I am proud of the excellent educational experience we provide for all our students.

It has been another exhilarating and fruitful term. What makes St James' unique is that our success is not just based on our results. The students' commitment to charity work through their own hard work and endeavour, demonstrates our values as a school. Students have also been able to participate in a range of visits and experiences including Skiing, Gaelic Football and Kwik Cricket; all these experiences allow us to develop more confident young people who have aspirations and ambition.

Our value of family has been demonstrated consistently during the Summer term, as we have welcomed our extended family of students from Cheadle Catholic Juniors, Cheadle Catholic Infants, Our Lady's, St Simon's, St Peter's and St Ambrose. This has involved different enrichment opportunities from "mini Olympics" for children in Year 2, to substance identification, via flame testing, for Year 5 children.

A number of works are taking place over the Summer holiday to ensure our whole site is updated and brought into line with the new branding. This will involve painting, new signs and new acrylic panels with pictures of our current students. Students within the spirituality prefect team have renamed our buildings; The St Catherine of Sienna building, The St Oscar Romero building, The St Francis Xavier building, The St Teresa of Avila building and The San Sebastian Sports Hall. This is to ensure our value of faith flows throughout the whole school site.

The most exciting part of our updating is the redevelopment of our school chapel and library. Currently the chapel is hidden away, and the library is used as a classroom. The new chapel will sit at the heart of the school; behind the wall which reads "With God all things are possible". This will once again place our value of faith at the centre of everything we do.

Our new library will be a space to enhance reading, which will also see a number of kindles purchased to complement our vast selection of books; the aim is to encourage more students to use the library before, during and after school for the purpose of reading.

As a reminder, latest news is continually added to our new website and twitter feed on a daily basis. Parents with current students at the school receive an alert to their device, via the MyEd App, notifying them of any new news story which has been shared on the St James' website.

I welcomed our new Year 7 students and parents, who will join us in September, to a taster day and to sample life at St James' on 4th of July. We continue to be an oversubscribed school, demonstrating that we are once again the local Catholic school of choice.

As Headteacher, I believe in high expectations for every student and will never settle for anything less. This is driven by our value of excellence. Please continue to support the school by re-enforcing respect for our school ethos with your child over the summer break, particularly the importance of high standards of attendance, punctuality, uniform and behaviour. Please be aware that from September, it is my expectation that all students will have transitioned to the full new school uniform that requires either the purchasing of a new blazer, or exchanging your voucher for a badge, to stitch over the existing one. From September students will not be allowed to wear any form of "hoodie" they are banned. Any pupil wearing a hoodie will have it removed and returned at the end of the day. Students continue to be able to wear coats when they are outside of the buildings, for example at lunchtimes.

I would like to take this opportunity to offer my most sincere thank you to all students, parents and staff who have supported the school this year. We will be welcoming all students back to school at 8.30am on Tuesday 3rd September.

May I wish you all a peaceful and restful summer and ask that you keep our Year 11 students in your prayers as they receive their results on Thursday 22nd August.

FAITH

A small number of Year 7 pupils have been part of Faith in Action in school and have participated in various different events and initiatives since Easter. The group supported CAFOD Family Fast Day, and through this, spent time reflecting on Maximilian Kolbe and discussing the idea of sacrifice. They produced a poster and this is now displayed in all the RE classrooms and the Year 7 form rooms. The group volunteered to support a Festival Celebrating Diversity at St Peter's in Hazel Grove. The evening was a celebration of difference hosted by St Peter's and a local Kurdish Refugee Community. The Caritas Ambassadors were there to help serve drinks and participate in a community event which is focused on the welcome that St Peter's has offered to a small group of refugees.

The group have also hosted a cake sale raising £48.51 to purchase plants for the prayer garden – they stayed behind after school to tidy up the garden and then planted plants that attract insects and bees. They also planted herbs which will hopefully be used by Food Technology.



As mentioned in last term's newsletter, we were raising money for Caritas, our diocesan charity by collecting 5ps. I am delighted to let you know that we raised £122.45, with special mention to 7A who managed to collect over £35.

ATTENDANCE NEWS

Congratulations to our pupils for their attendance performance.

Here at St James' attendance continues to be one of our primary foci. We finish this academic year with a very pleasing overall attendance figure of 95.52%. This has improved by a full percent from this time last year. We continue to strive to achieve our target of 96%.

Statistics prove that attendance has a direct effect on GCSE results. We use various techniques to highlight the importance of attendance to our pupils, to celebrate and recognise their attendance achievements and improvements.

Each half term we hold initiatives to reward 100% attendance. Last half term pupils received a certificate and a praise postcard through the post. At the end of the summer term, pupils achieving 100% for the whole term will receive a box of chocolates and a certificate.

Our attendance lottery draw, which is drawn fortnightly during Year group assemblies, has been a great focus to celebrate short term attendance attainment. If the name drawn has achieved 2 weeks full attendance, the pupil receives a £5 voucher. There is opportunity for a 'roll over' if 100% attendance was not achieved by this pupil.

Last half term, the form in each Year group with the best, and most improved, attendance received tubs of Celebration chocolates to share.

Trophies are also presented to the best attending form and most improved attending form in each Year group. The trophies are presented each half term.

Year 7 pupils have held a 'Horse Race' incentive this year. To celebrate Year 7's attendance of 96.23% for the whole year, any child achieving 96% and above will be invited to attend a Rewards Breakfast on the 18th July. Pupils will come together to celebrate their achievement and have a breakfast together. We are excited to announce that we will be holding a prize draw for an Ipad. Pupils who have done remarkably well in achieving 100% attendance for the whole school year will be entered into this draw. All the 100% attendance pupils will also receive a £10 Amazon voucher and a metal lapel badge to wear.
