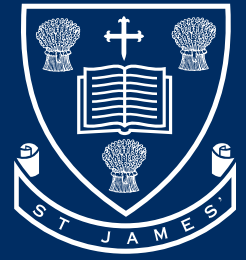


School Newsletter

Monday 14th March saw children given the opportunity to take part in our annual Pi day. Events included naming the dingbats stuck up around the building and trying to recite Pi to as many digits as possible. That week also saw us celebrate British Science week, where children were privileged to listen to two Zoom assemblies from leading scientists, one on shark science and one on space. At lunchtime, many Year 7 children took part in an investigative experiment making plastic from potatoes!

Throughout this term childrens' artistic talents have been evident in the impressive posters they created for Safer internet day and the cross hatching techniques they have been exploring in Art. We are so excited that so many Year 7 children auditioned for Matilda and secured lead roles in this whole school production. In Food and Nutrition, children showcased their newly acquired knife skills and attendance at the extracurricular lunchtime clubs of STEM and Equality has made for a very busy term!

Our children have additionally participated in a large number of literacy activities. Each Form has been gifted a reading book

which they are reading together as a group during registration, they took part in World Book Day activities and have also had the author Robert Muchamore come in to talk about his writing and Robin Hood series during the Literature Festival Week. Year 7 girls have been participating in a truly impressive number of sporting events this term including hockey, indoor athletics, netball and badminton. In January, several Year 7 girls also had the great privilege of being coached in badminton by Olympic gold medallist Gail Emms MBE. A huge congratulations must go to the Year 7B team who managed to win all of their games in the Stockport Tournament!

Not to be outdone, the boys have also taken part in football, badminton and athletics. With, as we go to press, our Year 7 football team going into the semi finals of the Greater Manchester Catholic School's cup.

The PE department also took a large number of our Year 7 children to an athletics competition at Sports city which was a fantastic opportunity and experience for them all. Year 7 are clearly a very talented group of young people with so much to offer but we are sure that some may be missing opportunities. We are delighted to have been able to reward so many of our Year 7 this term. The children with the largest number of Value points and a pupil chosen by their Form Tutor for outstanding contribution to the Form or school, along with a friend of their choice, were invited to a pizza lunch and a film afternoon.

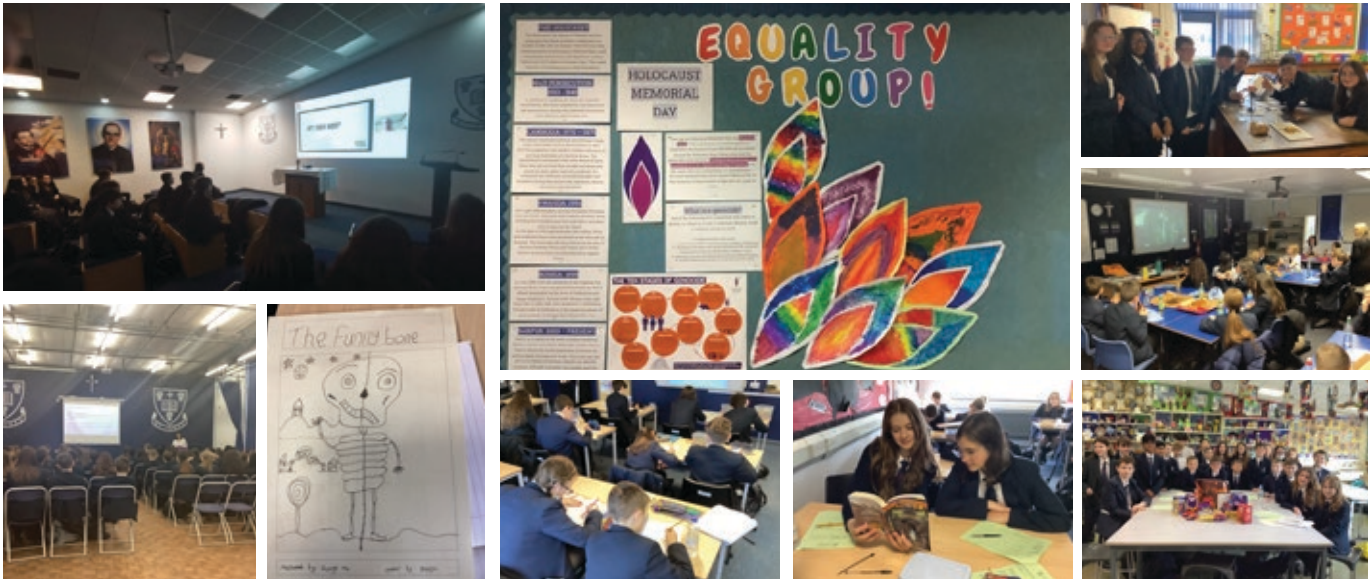
To celebrate Ash Wednesday, all children and staff received ashes to mark the start of the Lenten season. We were very proud of the five volunteers who read with such confidence during this service. During the Lenten period, children have had several chances to take part in fundraising charity events. Following an assembly, showing the work of CAFOD in helping those who do not have enough food, children were encouraged to participate in Family Fast day. This involved giving up a snack that they would have bought that day, and instead donating those few pence to CAFOD. They have bought cakes and donated spare change for Caritas and 7E have also been busy every lunch and registration selling tickets for an Easter egg raffle in order to raise money for Christian Aid.

It was fantastic for staff to share academic feedback and discuss the termly data at the Year 7 Parents' Evening on 24th March. This was a virtual event and was very well attended and we hope you found it useful and informative. Speaking of data, an impressive 96% of Year 7 children were in the 1,2 club this term and 12 children received an ATL 1 (excellent) for all of their subjects - an amazing achievement! YEAR 8



Family

Year 8 have enjoyed a busy yet successful Easter term. The definite highlight was being able to finally take the Year group on a retreat after Covid-19 had meant that such team-building events were impossible in Year 7. 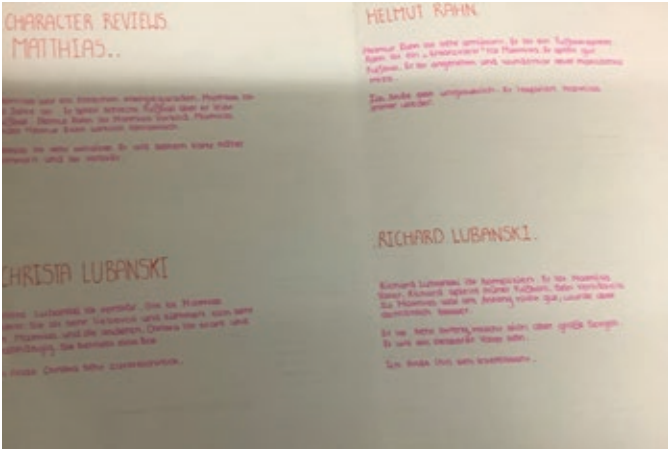

YEAR 11

In early January, some Year 10s and 11s were given the opportunity to attend a talk by an Oxbridge Admissions Officer at Cheadle Hulme High School; it encompassed how there should not be any stereotypes in terms of who enrolls at Oxford or Cambridge, advice on choosing courses and the process of admission. This gave the Year 10s and 11s a great insight as to how to approach university options. It is also important to remind our children that there are other options aside from university. Therefore, we have held an Apprenticeship Evening and our Careers Adviser offers weekly drop ins for anyone with questions or needing assistance, and Year 11 children who had shown a preference for apprenticeships received a presentation about apprenticeships within the construction sector.

In early February, we had the honour of the Mayor of Greater Manchester, Andy Burnham, being our special guest for a talk about things to bear in mind when choosing careers (and politics, of course); it went so well that one of our Year 11, Max M, was able to gain an opportunity for some work experience with Andy Burnham himself.

In the last week of half term, children chosen due to their hard work, had the treat of Domino's pizza and a movie afternoon. This was a well deserved and much enjoyed experience.

Later on into the month, the Year 11s did their second set of GCSE mock examinations in the current year; this provided even more time for them to practise being in the exam hall, applying the right exam technique to their questions and gaining confidence all before the real exams in May and June. Also, in preparation for the

exams, a drama company came into school to perform Macbeth for our Year 11s. This was a great opportunity to ask questions and visualise the whole play, helping revision for English literature.

To begin Lent, we held Ash Wednesday services reminding us throughout this busy time in the year of the significance of Jesus' fasting for 40 days and nights. On the 15th of March we held a Mass for Ukraine and we prayed for those that have lost loved ones or are fleeing their homes.

On St Patrick's Day, Mr Gallagher hosted a talk revolving around this feast day. He was talking about how throughout history the Irish people defended their culture and heritage despite opposition. He even showed off his Irish flute playing skills and his past Irish dancing success.

ATTENDANCE

Attendance as a whole at St James' is very good and is something which we can all be proud of. As such, we like to recognise and reward children at key points of the academic year. Current statistics show that our whole school attendance is consistently 3.5% higher than the national average which is a great achievement.

Our fortnightly attendance lottery for each Year Group has continued throughout this half term. This incentive is to reward short term attendance of 100% for a 2-week period. The lucky winner is pulled from a draw and wins a £5 Amazon voucher. As Easter approaches, I have reintroduced our popular Easter egg challenge during this Lenten period. Any pupil who has achieved 100% attendance from March 2nd to our last day of term, April 1st, will be rewarded with an Easter egg.

Statistics clearly prove that attendance has a direct effect on GCSE results. It is important that your child attends school as much as

possible so that their gaps in knowledge are impacted as little as possible.

SPIRITUALITY & CHAPLAINCY

This half term has allowed us as a community to experience the beginning of the Lenten season, with children participating in assemblies on Prayer, Fasting and Almsgiving, as well as each Year group participating in an Ash Wednesday service, where they were able to receive their ashes. Entering this Lenten season, children and staff alike are encouraged to reflect on our role as members of the Catholic family, by considering how we can be better in ourselves and to those around us. It can become easy to forget the true meaning of Lent and Easter, however by aspiring to be better Catholics and truly reflecting God's actions and God's love to those around us, we can turn our attention towards repentance and growing further into our faith. During Lent, we mirror the 40 days Jesus spent in the desert, and aim to fast, pray and give to those around us, just as Jesus did. In assembly, children have been able to explore the idea that fasting does not necessarily mean they have to give something up, but instead it means that they can make a positive change to take on something new, inspired by the Holy Father's Lenten message:

"Fast from hurting words and say kind words...Fast from anger and be filled with patience...Fast from worries and have trust in God."

As well as Lent, children have had a number of other opportunities to enrich their faith life here at St James', for example Years 8 and 9 who had the opportunity for a retreat day with Shrewsbury Youth Mission Team, where they explored the theme of values, and were encouraged to really consider what it is that they value in their own lives.

Additionally, this half term has seen the start of school Masses being organised during lunch times, as well as independent prayer time for children, where they are able to make use of the Chapel to pray during their lunch times should they wish. Children will also have the opportunity during their RE classes to further explore the meaning of Lent, and to engage with the meaning of Easter in the Catholic church, to further prepare them for Holy Week.

Here at St James' we will be continuing to celebrate and enrich the faith life of our school, with regular lunch time clubs, worship, liturgy and also parish and Diocesan links, so that we can best support our children in the context of both our school community as well as the wider Catholic family.
